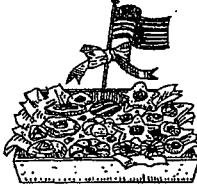

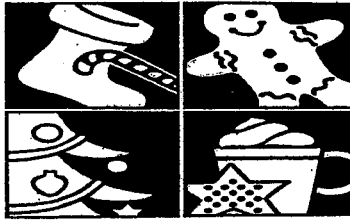

## **Mission Project on Domestic Violence**

Many of you may know that my family and I have been personally affected by domestic violence and how it has changed the shape of our lives. Our daughter, Patricia Brown, was violently murdered by the father of her child, our granddaughter, Makenzi. I have shared my story once on Domestic Violence Sunday and then again in greater detail at the Presbyterian Women Fall Gathering. I spoke about the need to become informed and involved because domestic violence is very prevalent and the effects are long lasting deadly.

In May of this year, the Session, at my request, gave permission to allow Domestic Violence to become a mission project of our church. The very essence of what it means to a church is to be mission minded. The Church is called to participate in God's activity in the world through its life for others by healing, reconciling and binding up wounds. We must minister to the needs of those who are powerless and engage in the struggle to free people from oppression and injustice. The Church is called to undertake mission. In today's world, church mission resembles a form of modern day social work. Just as the social workers are called to get involved in the lives of the poor and the sick; in a similar way, the church is also called to get involved to make a difference.

Trinity United's commitment to get involved must begin with us. What would mission work in

“O Little Town of Bethlehem”

In 1865, a young American preacher named Phillips Brooks spent time in and around the fields of Bethlehem. On Christmas Eve, he attended worship in the Church of the Nativity, located on the site where traditions says Jesus was born.

Brooks was so spiritually touched by the experience that he later wrote a hymn for children to sing on Christmas Eve in his Philadelphia church. Lewis Redner, the church organist and Sunday school superintendent, composed the music for the beloved hymn, “O Little Town of Bethlehem.” Today it appears in most denominational hymnals. Brooks, a giant of a man physically (6’6”) was known throughout America as an eloquent and dominant force in the pulpit.

There is a large statue of the gifted man of God in front of Boston’s famous Trinity Church, where Brooks last served. His death in 1893 was a major event to Boston. Upon learning of his passing, a 5-year-old girl exclaimed, “Oh, Mama, how happy the angels will be.
